



Dr. Susan Hillis, PhD, serves at Oxford University as Senior Research Officer and *Co-Chair of the Global Reference Group on Children Affected by Crisis: Joint Estimates and Action*, which is hosted by the World Health Organization. She also serves at U.S. Bureau of Global Health Security and Diplomacy-PEPFAR, as Senior Technical Advisor for Faith and Communities Initiatives. Dr. Hillis serves as Asst. Dean for Continuing Medical and Dental Education for physicians serving in mission hospitals around the world; she further serves as Senior Technical Advisor for World Without Orphans Movement, active in 60 countries. Since July 2021, Dr. Hillis and the Global Reference Group have authored 15 publications, including in *the Lancet*, *Pediatrics*, and *JAMA Pediatrics*, on COVID-associated orphanhood globally and in the U.S., and various Policy Reports outlining evidence-based solutions for children impacted by violence and trauma. These reports urge every nation to prioritize caring for orphaned and vulnerable children as a key priority of their current health, social protection, and child development plans, as well Pandemic Response and Climate Action Plans. Dr. Hillis previously served as a career officer at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Her global research led to over 150 peer-reviewed publications addressing HIV, violence against children, sexually transmitted infections, COVID-19, and orphans and vulnerable children. She is co-author the INSPIRE evidence-based technical package for Ending Violence Against Children, which is endorsed by the top leadership at 10 key global agencies, including CDC, PEPFAR, USAID, WHO, UNICEF, and others. Dr. Hillis received a PhD in epidemiology from University of North Carolina, and then served as a CDC Epidemic Intelligence Service Officer. As a U.S. Public Health Service Officer, CAPT Hillis received the highest non-combat medal, the Meritorious Service Medal, for domestic and global contributions to strengthening public health.
